2023 STRATEGIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Managed the continued changing dynamics of the fire service to continue to provide all necessary fire and emergency medical services to our community.
- Applied for a CWDG Grant to continue to support funding for fuels reduction and mitigation.
- Completed year 2 of 3 of the HMGP mitigation grant for fuels mitigation within and around
 Suncrest to include meeting our annual CWPP commitment.
- Completed our 4th Seasonal Fuels Crew program with 10 members to provide fuels mitigation,
 Wildland Deployment support, and Fire Wise Home Assessments.
- Took delivery of a new Type 6 Wildland Engine for enhanced deployment capabilities additional local support of Urban Interface fires.
- Completed the NWCG Engine Boss Certification for 1 additional member for local & deployment oversight & support.
- Completed our first full year department fire and medical training plan to provide consisentency and quality training to build our personnel and enhance service delivery.
- Completed 2 Wildland Deployments 2 Out of State Resource Deployments to New Mexico, and California; 1 In State Resource Deployment to Tooele County for controlled burn.
- Deployed our new tracked Skidsteer with mulching attachment purchased through the HMGP grant to expand and support our fuels mitigation efforts.
- Hosted our 3rd Annual Fire Prevention Open House at Draper Park with and estimated 400 attendees.
- Hosted the 2nd Annual All Future Female Firefighters (AFFF) event to expose and highlight the fire service as a career option to female high school seniors.
- Ordered a new Tiller Aerial apparatus to support west side growth and in anticipation of a 4th station in October that has a 46-48 month build timeframe.



EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT BUREAU

Training & Education:

- Initiated work on the Shelter Annex specific to Draper for emergency sheltering during large scale incidents and disasters.
- Drafted MOU's for the Shelter Annex to partner with Draper School's, Business', Hospital, and other area stakeholders. (Needing Legal clearance)
- Initiated work on the Logistics Annex
- Continued training and update with SLCo of WebEOC for City and County wide use and communication for training and active incidents.
- Started training on a new program "Crisis Track" standardized for FEMA to gather disaster incident/location functioning in real-time collection.

2023 EOC Activation for Flooding Event:

- Created a WebEOC incident during the floods that affected critical infrastructure during the August 3rd rain storm.
- Maintained a continuous status updates and cost tracking for critical infrastructure repairs for potential state
 or federal emergency funding.




