Mayor's Message

Budget Season and Public Safety



May and June are busy months for our finance department. The current fiscal year ends June 30 and a new fiscal year begins July 1. Preparing a new fiscal year budget is a months-long process involving analyzing costs, assessing needs, and considering public feedback. With final budget approval scheduled at a city council meeting in June, we have a good picture at this point of needs and resources.

A critical area that has become urgent to address is public safety staffing. Fire and police departments are facing recruitment and retention challenges nationwide, and Draper is no exception. Over the past few years, it has become increasingly difficult to recruit and retain qualified personnel. This can be attributed to many factors, including the following:

- A decrease in interest in the professions by young people, resulting in fewer applicants, while retirements and resignations have increased
- Non-traditional work schedules – weekend, holiday, overnight, and multi-day shifts (fire)
- Strong job market with higher

salaries in the private sector

- Cities/counties competing against each other to offer better compensation/benefits to those who want to stay in the profession, leading to frequent turnover
- Negative portrayals of and attitudes toward police
- Stress and traumatic experiences in these careers can adversely affect mental health

Financially, a big impact recently is seeing recruits the City has trained leave for other agencies within one to two years. It takes just under a year to hire and train a police officer, and the cost is significant. Training fire personnel is also expensive. It costs between \$40,000-50,000 per person for the required three-month fire recruit training. We want to attract and retain the best public safety professionals, not be a training ground for other cities.

Draper City's police and fire staffing is currently strained. Overtime shifts are routinely offered and

sometimes become mandatory. With turnover already an issue, burnout is a real concern. Mutual aid agreements with neighboring cities help but can't provide all the coverage needed.

We are exploring ways to keep high-quality professionals in our community. This includes incentives such as bonuses, additional leave time, wage adjustments, and other benefits. And yes, an increase in property tax may be necessary to keep salaries and benefits competitive.

Draper City has the lowest property tax rates in Salt Lake County for general government and public safety services. There has not been a tax increase since 2007. We are conservative with taxpayer dollars but public safety is not something we can skimp on.

Draper is fortunate to have excellent fire and police departments. Our personnel are top-notch, and we want to keep them here.


LOVE YOUR YARD (EVEN) MORE IN 2024!


BRING ON THE SUNSHINE!

Draper Animal Services would like to remind all fur families about a few things as we enter the warmer weather. Make sure your pets have adequate water and shelter from the sun. Check gates and fences for any damage the wet winter may have caused to prevent any escape artist from leaving your yard unattended.

Unless you are at one of the three off-leash dog parks in Draper, always keep your pets on a leash when out for a walk or visiting the city parks and trails — it is the law, and we don't want to ruin your day by issuing a citation. You need to stay present with your dog while in the off-leash parks. An updated City license is required as well.

Our staff loves to see pets and their owners out and about enjoying the nice, warm days. Please follow the rules that are posted at all park and trail entrances. Don't forget to pick up your dog's poop and toss it in the trash.

Draper is a wonderful place to live, with great things to see and do. Here are ten fun, free things to do in Draper this summer:

- 1 Hike the Jungle Trail. Specifically built for children with lots to climb over and under and through, it's only one mile out and back — perfect for the littles.
- 2 Visit the Splash Pad. It's a great place to cool off on super hot days. The ice cream truck is also often found at this summer favorite.
- 3 Ride bikes and scooters on the paved Porter Rockwell Trail, starting at Draper Park. Make sure to check out the Unity Playground, with the tallest slide in Utah!
- 4 Explore Mehraban Wetlands. This is a short, easy paved trail rests between two ponds with lots of ducks and geese, and a great pier area for aspiring fishers. Interpretative signage along the path explains the plants and wildlife you may encounter.
- 5 Hike to the Suspension Bridge.

At 2.5 miles this hike is slightly more difficult, but the awesome views and bridge make it worth it. The bridge is 185 feet long and was donated to the city by the Wadsworth family. Dogs are allowed, but must be leashed.

6 Take a blanket and a picnic to one of the summer concerts in June at the Historic Park. These are free and kids can dance and play right up front. See a full listing of performers and dates on page 4.

7 Take advantage of the new My County Rec Pass, open to all Salt Lake County kids ages 5-18. The pass offers free entrance to all county facilities, including swimming pools, drop-in gym use, use of the climbing wall, and more. Learn more about this on page 3.

8 Hike the Lupine Loop. This short trail is perfect for families and is only for hikers — no bikes or dogs allowed. There are plenty of wildflowers, great views, and

even wild turkeys to spot.

9 Visit the Flight Park. As one of the very best places to paraglide in all of the United States, the smooth, consistent winds have long made the Point of the Mountain a destination for flying. Originally a site to launch test planes during World War I, this is a great place to have a picnic, watch pilots take off and land, fly a kite, and stargaze.

10 Try your hand at pickleball at the expanded courts at Southfork Park! With double the courts, more people can get in on the fun.

A couple of extras just for fun: Launch a kayak or paddle board at the new Draper launch pad at Jordan River Rotary Park, providing access to the Jordan River Trail. Or check out the Draper Farmers Market this summer at Smith Fields Park.

PET WASTE IS A BIG DEAL

Draper City is working with the community to keep our water sources clean. Join us by keeping pet waste out of streams, canals, rivers and lakes.

When cleaning up pet waste, do you bag and trash it? That's the right thing to do! Trash collectors pick up garbage and take it to the landfill facility, located at the watershed's bottom so potential problem-solving components of the trash aren't carried through our waterways.

concentration that ends up in the waterways. A gram of dog waste can contain 23 million fecal coliform bacteria and parasites, whose eggs dispersed from feces can survive for years outdoors. These pathogens can be passed to other dogs or humans, and gets washed into lakes and rivers where people swim.

When reaching streams, canals, rivers or lakes, waste decays, using up oxygen and releasing ammonia. Low oxygen levels and ammonia

WHY SCOOP?
Unsettling Facts About Dog Waste

- Dog waste is NOT fertilizer for your lawn.** In fact, it's just the opposite and can be very toxic to your soil. Due to their high-protein diet, dog waste is highly acidic and will actually burn your grass creating brown patches.
- Just one gram of dog waste can contain as many as 23 million fecal coliform bacteria.** Waste can seep into groundwater and spread salmonella and giardia. This poses a hazard to your pets, your family and your landscape.
- Dog fecal matter is a major contributor to stormwater pollution.** One out of three households have at least one dog, and all that dog poop left out can be blown into storm drains, lakes, and streams. When in water, the liquid waste consumes the oxygen and releases ammonia which contaminates our resources as well as harms the fish that reside there.
- Your lawn mower doesn't help, in fact can make it worse.** Mowers will actually chip up the waste into smaller pieces and spread it further throughout your yard where you, your children, and your pets continue to step in it and then bring it into your home.
- The EPA classified dog waste as a dangerous pollutant in the same category as toxic chemicals and oil.** The average dog defecates approximately three quarters of a pound of waste per day, which adds up to 275 pounds per year. Your yard might be more polluted than you think.
- The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) confirms that hookworms, ringworms, tapeworms and Salmonella can be spread by contact with infected dog waste.** It can take over one year for dog waste to decay but even when it has visibly disappeared, the parasite eggs it contained can linger on for years in your soil - leaving your family and your pets vulnerable to serious infection.

What you can do. Bag it and trash it. ALWAYS.

If left to decay on the sidewalk, gutter or grass near the street, dog waste breaks down until washed into storm drainage systems by rain or melting snow. None of the water in gutters, storm drains, creeks, rivers and lakes in Salt Lake County goes to a treatment plant.


As carnivores, dog waste differs from other wildlife, containing higher concentrations of bacteria than wildlife that consume ecosystem resources. Nutrient-heavy pet food is designed to give dogs a complete diet. A single pile of pet waste will continue to release nutrients every time it rains until flushed away. If added to the waste of other wildlife, pet waste creates too high of a bacteria/pollutant

combined with warm temperatures kill fish. Pet waste contains nutrients that encourage weed and algae growth. Overly fertile water becomes cloudy, slimy, and green/black as a result of eutrophication, causing health concerns for waterbodies, fish, and recreationists.

Pet waste carries diseases which can make water unsafe for contact. In addition to E.coli, health concerns include Campylobacteriosis and Salmonellosis bacterial infections, Toxocariasis roundworm infection, and Toxoplasmosis and Giardiasis protozoan parasite infections.

WATER CONSERVATION REBATE PROGRAMS

Thanks to Draper City's adopted water-efficiency standards and partnership with Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District, Draper residents are eligible to earn up to \$3 per square foot for replacing the lawn in your park strip with a water-efficient design. Landscaping project options include park strip, side yard, and full yard conversions.

Homeowners can receive \$0.50 per square foot to convert planting beds watered with spray irrigation to drip irrigation.

Homeowners can receive \$100 per tree for up to five trees, when planted in conjunction with a turf conversion

project.

Get paid up to \$75 when you purchase and install a WaterSense-labeled smart controller that adjusts the water your yard gets based on local weather and yard conditions. All Utahns are eligible.

Receive up to \$100 by replacing your old toilet with a WaterSense-labeled one. Any toilet manufactured before 1994 may qualify. You may submit up to 2 toilets per application. All Utahns are eligible.

Dirt started turning at The Point in March as crews began installing a major natural gas pipeline. This construction represents the culmination of years of proactive planning and signals the start of a major development milestone. In the coming months, construction will commence on the installation

of water, sewer, road and utility infrastructure.

The Point of the Mountain State Land Authority anticipates construction of buildings to start as early as the end of this year. They are hiring a Director of Land Development to oversee these development efforts, and are working with the Utah Department of Transportation and the Utah Transit Authority

on environmental studies of both light rail and commuter rail projects at The Point.

The progress made in a short period of time could not have happened without the collaboration and support of the public and strategic partners.
