Mayor's Message Station Area Plan



I hope you are all transitioning well from the holidays to spring. We are in the throes of the 2025 legislative session, which has been busy for me as Mayor and President of the Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT).

The legislature is looking to improve our housing situation statewide. Many issues are out of our direct control and the government can't solve this problem in isolation.

ULCT works to keep our land use

authority and ability to plan for our community. As a political subdivision of the state, we work toward smart and functional housing objectives, striving for homeownership for our kids and grandkids.

The legislature has enacted laws to create more housing and different kinds of housing. One law requires municipalities with a transit station to enact a "Station Area Plan" (SAP) for each stop within the city.

This is a legislative mandate. However, it is a negotiated mandate because cities get to craft the plan. But we must do it or suffer state penalties. We have three station areas in Draper: Frontrunner at Vista Station and the Trax stops at Kimball's Lane and the Draper Town Center.

Our first SAP will be for the Draper Town Center. This process began in the fall of 2022, and is almost done. The plan is a vision and fiveyear development plan for areas within ½ mile of Draper Town Center. The legislature's objectives are to increase the availability and affordability of housing, promote sustainable environmental conditions, enhance access to opportunities, and increase transportation choices and connections.

Our project team, in collaboration with the project Stakeholder Committee, has developed a Preferred Concept and Draft Plan. This draft plan was created from professional design recommendations and stakeholder, staff, and public input. Feedback was solicited via multiple Stakeholder Committee meetings, public open houses, and a survey. Project goals included:

Heritage: Preserve key aspects of Draper's history and incorporate them into the urban design and public space of the station area.

Respect surrounding neighborhoods: Integrate new

neighborhoods: Integrate new development and improvements in a way that respects the existing community.

Town Center gathering place: Establish the station area as a gathering place and destination for the Draper community.

Complementary mix: Mix uses in a complementary way and include housing and recreation as key uses.

Connectivity and access: Connect the station area to maximize access to the station, link among the key sites, make the station area accessible to the community, and overcome topography and barriers.

Balance and link modes: Balance and link a foundation of walkability with the other modes of transit, bicycling, and traffic.

Regional benefits: Increase access to regional opportunities via the Draper Town Center Station, increase housing affordability, and realize other regional benefits.

The City held a public hearing at the Planning Commission meeting February 27 and will hold another at the City Council meeting March 4 at 7:00 PM to adopt the Draper Town Center SAP into the General Plan for the area surrounding the Draper Town Center TRAX station in compliance with state code.

We appreciate all who have participated in this process, especially Draper residents closest to the station area, Utah Transit Authority (UTA), and IFA. Find more information about the project at DraperTownCenterStation.org.

Once completed, we will bring forward the other plans by the end of this year. We have a deadline to meet under the state code. Our goal is to make a plan that fits our city and meets state code. These plans represent opportunities for owned housing and economic development. We are trying our best to navigate and plan with our state partners.

LOCALSCAPES: CREATING YOUR IDEAL DRAPER YARD

Now is a great time to plan your spring landscaping. A simple place to start is your park strip. Replace thirsty, decorative turf with beautiful, Utah-friendly plants and trees.

Five great reasons to flip your strip:

- 1. Park strips are often the largest water wasters as they are hot and narrow sprinklers overspray onto the street or sidewalk, sending water down the drain
- 2. The average Draper family uses 7,000 10,000 gallons of water every season on their strip
- 3. They are typically not used for recreation no one will miss the turf
- 4. Your park strip is the first thing you see when you come home it can be beautiful and lower maintenance

5. Draper residents are eligible to earn up to \$3 per square foot for replacing the lawn in your park strip with a water efficient design, thanks to Draper's water-efficiency standards and partnership with Jordan Valley Water Conservation District; visit utahwatersavers.com for more information

City Council Message

At a recent city council meeting, one of the agenda items filled the seats of the chambers. It became apparent from comments during the public hearing that opinions on the matter before us were

Yet, as we listened to a large number of residents share their perspectives for almost two hours, none of the dialogue escalated into arguments, insults, or other disruptive behavior. RECYCLED MATERIALS REPORT JULY 1 - DECEMBER 31, 2024

Curbside Recycling

During the six month period from July 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024 our recycling trucks have picked up 859.62 tons of recyclables from your curbside blue lid recycling containers. We call this mixed load collection because it contains plastic bottles, metal cans, corrugated cardboard, and paper. Each day we deliver these mixed loads to Rocky Mountain Recycling Services in Salt Lake City. Rocky Mountain Recycling is a material recovery facility (MRF). They use a state-of-the-art sort line, as well as trained staff to ensure that as much recyclable material as possible is reclaimed. The sorted cardboard, paper, plastic, and metal is then baled and sent to various production mills across the country to be made into new products.

Mixed Load Contamination

Rocky Mountain Recycling runs a test sort each month where our driver empties the load in an open area and then a recycling staff member sorts through the truck load and determines how much is recyclable and how much is contamination, meaning materials that cannot be recycled. Our average during this six month period is 11.20% contamination, which means 11.20% of what we pickup in curbside containers is not recyclable. This is where we need your help.

What can I put in my recycle

Cardboard (please flatten boxes), paper, newspaper, cereal boxes, toilet roll and paper towel tubes, aluminum cans, steel cans, plastic containers with necks/lids. The recycle can is for loose materials only — don't put recyclable items in bags.

Keep these things out of your blue-lid recycle can!

Plastic bags of any kind, fast food containers, greasy or soiled wrappers and packaging, wax coated cardboard, Styrofoam, packing peanuts, bubble wrap,

yard waste, and glass.


Corrugated Cardboard

In addition to the mixed loads from your curbside cans, we also have two single stream drop off containers. One for corrugated cardboard at the Public Works facility (72 E Sivogah Ct), and the other for glass at City Hall (1020 E Pioneer Rd). During this 6 month period, Draper residents have recycled 27.95 tons of corrugated cardboard. Keep in mind that cardboard doesn't weigh very much. A 30 yard dumpster where the cardboard has been compacted weighs an average of 1.97 tons. Corrugated cardboard is also delivered to Rocky Mountain Recycling for processing.

Glass

From the dumpster at City Hall we have recycled 59.63 tons of glass. We take the glass to Momentum Recycling where it is cleaned, dried and crushed, then sorted into various sizes ranging from pebbles to sand and even powder depending on its end market. 


